



The Ninilchik Village Tribe is a federally recognized tribe in Alaska, consisting of approximately 1,000 members. These members can trace their ancestry to Ninilchik tribal lands or are Alaskan Natives and American Indians who have settled within the tribal boundaries and have been accepted for membership. The Tribe is governed by the Ninilchik Traditional Council, comprised of five elected council members who serve three-year terms. They



oversee tribal operations and uphold sovereignty using Organic Documents approved by the tribal membership.

Executive Director's Address



Happy Spring! After 'Punxsutawney Phil' saw his shadow and blessed us with six more weeks of winter, we are finally seeing longer days. This means that the fish are around the corner.

Sadly, the commercial setnet fishery is closed again for the third year. On a positive note, we will be working to get the subsistence allocation for the Ninilchik Community in the Kenai and Kasilof Rivers again this summer. The Tribe has applied for the Educational Fishery for 2025. Due to continued restrictions by the state, it is doubtful that our educational needs will be met. The Tikahtnu Inter-Tribal Fish Commission (TIFC) is working diligently to address additional fishing opportunities for our people. Established under the sovereign authority of its Member Tribes, the TIFC operates with delegated Tribal authority to secure and protect Tribal access to fisheries, influence fishery management, and advance Tribal costewardship. We are working with National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) to advance a

Tribal Salmon Fishery in the Cook Inlet Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) for consideration by the North Pacific Fishery Management Council (NPFMC). Under our proposal, Tribes in the Cook Inlet would be permitted to participate in a fishery identical to the commercial drift gillnet fishery. This would further allow members to get fish to fill their freezers and the smokehouse. While this will take years to attain, the goal is to get every additional opportunity to get more fish. In furtherance of this endeavor, we continue to hold multiple meetings and have strong Tribal support under the leadership of co-chairs Samuel Schimmel and Debra Call.

The Niqualchint Heritage Center planning, engineering, and permitting is going well. We have been working on permitting for construction, along with Fire Marshall approval and engineering updates. On behalf of the Ninilchik Traditional Council we want to express our heartfelt thanks to Cook Inlet Tribal Council (CITC). Under the leadership of Gloria O'Neill, CITC President/CEO and their board of directors, they have graciously donated the eleven acres of property next to the heritage center as a gift to our project. We now have the deed to the property and will incorporate this in our planning work for the cultural heritage center. Thank you CITC!

Our 8(a) company Tuyan, LLC is doing very well. Greg and I attended the national 8(a) conference this past month and have been meeting with leadership to develop new opportunities. The engineering contract continues to derive a nice net profit, and we anticipate more growth.

We are looking to recruit any young Tribal Members who may be interested in getting more involved in leadership and the Council process. Several Tribes and organizations have Youth Advisory Councils that provide youth input, learn about the leadership of the Tribe, and participate in governance. Please let me know if you or anyone in your family might be interested in this endeavor. NTC is especially interested in youth in high school or college who would be interested in generative leadership here at the Tribe.

Our health clinics are doing very well. Please note that we are switching over to a new electronic health record system - Athena. Staff have been training for weeks. There will be a new Athena Patient Portal that you will notice as we switch over as of April 1st. This new system will also do our billing and should allow us to advance our patient management system and health records, furthering better interaction and care. As with any new system there will always be a few glitches and a learning curve, so we ask for your patience as we integrate this new system into our clinics. As always, thank you for your support!

Hello, Ninilchik Tribal Members,

The weather has been teasing us, reminding me that it's almost Fish-On time!

So here we go again - getting ready in case a volcano erupts and buries us in ash. Don't worry, it's not the end of the world, but it is something you can, and should, start preparing for now, before the need arises. The main thing to do at this time is get some supplies put away in case you have to stay home for a little while. I say a week's worth of food, water, and meds for the whole household. Hopefully, after COVID, most people have learned and are well-stocked up, so they won't be caught off guard again. The next thing to keep in mind is if you do have to go outside, you need to protect your eyes and lungs. We want eye protection that fits tightly around your eyes in case the wind is blowing. And when isn't it? Next, N95 masks. These are made for dust particulates and are handy to have on hand anyway. I buy mine on eBay by the 50 or 60 pack and use them in my woodshop. They are a lot more comfortable to wear than a respirator for any length of time. Buy a name brand like 3M and know they will work and protect your lungs. If you do go outside, you may want to dress in a manner that keeps the dust outside. Put that foul weather gear on when you go outside and take it off outside the door before coming in. Volcanic ash can be extremely hard on electronics in the home, so keep as much outside as you can. Try and keep doors and windows closed and sealed as well as possible. Heaters need air, and they most often draw it from within the home. When they do that, it creates a vacuum that will suck the air through the windows and doors, attic, and floors, bringing ash with it. It won't be the end of the world if some does find its way into the home, but eliminating as much as you can is what you're aiming for.

I also recommend always having a Go Bag ready and in your car. This bag should always be prepared for you and every family member. I keep one for myself in the car. You never know - earthquake, volcano, storm, or you break down and must start hoofing it. You want to pack this for the time of year, with the idea of staying with the car or walking. This time of year, I have a sleeping bag, winter boots, gloves, hats, a sweater, an extra coat, meds, granola bars, Bic lighters, a knife, a small metal cup that can be heated to melt snow, and a small can with sand and rubbing alcohol that can be poured on the sand and used as a stove to melt water and give heat if need be. If you're doing this within a closed environment, you will need to crack a window to let fresh air in and not be overcome with carbon monoxide. Think about what you would need if something happened and you weren't at home, and throw it in the car. Be reasonable - you only need something to keep you safe, either for getting home on foot or until someone can come to you. Planning will keep you comfortable and alive.

In closing, I've been through several volcanoes over the years. They were all exciting but far from dangerous. It's one of those things that really doesn't have to be anything more than another life experience that we talk about with friends and family. Enjoy and don't forget the camera.

Just another reminder: The Weatherization Program is a \$2,000 grant that can help seal those cracks and holes you have within your home!

Until the next letter, take care, get those gardens going, and fish on!

THE FUTURE OF OUR ELECTRONIC HEALTH RECORDS

Starting April 1, 2025, we will transition to Athena for our electronic health records, billing, and patient portal. Keep an eye out for communications from Athena, including texts, emails, or calls - this may also include an invitation to the Athena Patient Portal. We appreciate your patience as we all adjust to this new system. If we have your email address, you can expect to receive an email from the Athena Patient Portal.

Patient Portal

The Follow My Health (FMH) portal will remain accessible for prior medical records. Starting April 1st, all communications and services will be available through the new Athena portal.

Billing Statements

Statements for services **on or after 4/1/25** will come from Athena. Statements for services **before 4/1/25** will continue to come from Veradigm. >>You may receive statements from both systems.

Reminder Notifications

You'll receive reminder calls (2 days before), texts (3 days before), and emails (4 days before) based on your selected preferences during registration.

- You can confirm or cancel appointments through these notifications.
- Calls are automated, but you can speak with a representative to reschedule if needed.

Self-Scheduling

You can now schedule visits online for physicals, problem visits, or telehealth with select providers directly through the online portal!

Currently, one provider at each location is available for this feature while we test this new and exciting feature, with plans to expand soon.

Preparing for a Volcanic Eruption

Experts are closely monitoring Mount Spurr, with increased anticipation of a potential eruption. To help you stay safe, here are some important tips on how to prepare for the event.

Make a Plan

- Develop evacuation and sheltering plans for your household.
- Review the plans to ensure everyone understands them.

Get Supplies

• Flashlight, extra batteries, first aid kit, emergency food & water, can opener, medications, sturdy shoes, respiratory protection (N95 mask), and a battery-powered radio.

Protect Yourself from Ash

• Use a NIOSH-approved N95 respirator outdoors or during cleanup. Nuisance dust masks offer limited protection.

Evacuation Preparations

- Follow authorities' instructions to evacuate.
- Stay informed through radio, TV, and disaster sirens.
- Pack emergency supplies, including medications and a car kit.
- Ensure your vehicle is fueled and ready for evacuation.

Protect Pets and Livestock

Plan for your pets and secure livestock in an enclosed area.

Shelter in Place

- Close windows, lock doors, and turn off HVAC systems.
- Shelter in an interior room, away from windows, and bring pets with you.


Stay Informed

The Elders Outreach Program's Luncheon exists to serve as a social space for Enrolled Tribal Elders to gather, share, and visit. Elders are welcome to bring a guest, family member, or caregiver, if they wish. A donation box will be available at the back for this purpose. While it is a provided luncheon for Enrolled Tribal Elders to attend, it also serves many homebound Enrolled Tribal Elders who cannot drive or have other needs that prevent them from attending. The luncheon is also for these Elders, and we ask that all be mindful of others who are not able to attend, as any additional food will be provided and delivered to their homes.

Craft Wednesdays

The Elders Outreach Program began a weekly crafting class on Wednesdays of each week in February of 2024. Whoever attends has a chance to include ideas, options and suggestions to the group for crafting together on projects. Though, one could attend and primarily work on a project they would like to do, but do not have a sewing machine or other tools we provide here. Over this past year, the group has made jewelry, home goods, cultural pieces, painting projects, and baked goods. If you would like to attend or have questions, please reach out to us.

If you are an Enrolled Tribal Elder and would like one, please let us know.

Many of you have asked about our LFPA Plus Grant and our OAA grants, both of which continue at normal operating funding, we have not had any funding cut due to changes in the Federal Administration. This is great news!

We worked hard on updating the new Elders Outreach Office and crafting area. We welcome you to swing by and come visit anytime as we are no longer in the Ninilchik Traditional Council Administrative Office. Our location is 15750 Sterling Hwy, across from Ninilchik School, in the freshly painted blue office next to the Subsistence Building. All the services we offer here include our Moose Hanging Room, Freezers, Smokehouse, Fish Fileting Tables, and Utility room. Our Utility Room houses our vacuum sealer, bone cutting saw, and other useful items such as grinders, canners, and pressure cookers.

The Elders Outreach Program has evolved over the past decade, and we not only offer our luncheon, crafting, and other events - we also pick up groceries and prescriptions on Fridays. If you would like assistance for those needs, please reach out, some Elders call or set up online orders and that can be useful. We also help transport Elders in our community to Clinical or Behavioral Health appointments, please call for scheduling as this requires our ability to coordinate. We also haul trash weekly, typically on Wednesdays, we only haul trash that is bagged and can be transported to our local dumpsite, we do not haul larger items. We can also assist in helping with paperwork or transporting to the Independent Living Center or with Medicare/Medicaid assistance. Please call for scheduling on this as well to set up time in our office. Jessica and I are happy to help with many errands and needs, we only request time to schedule needs for any of these tasks.

We are also working on collaboration for our Heritage Center, if you have photos you'd like to offer or be scanned, items that you feel would be educational or relevant from our village, please call to have us help attain any such items or photos. We greatly appreciate all our history that makes our community so unique.

Expanding Access to Compassionate Care

We are proud to introduce Project STACEY - Supporting Treatment Access and Community Engagement for Your Recovery - our new Mobile Addiction Treatment Clinic designed to bring essential services directly to the communities that need them most. With over 125 patients enrolled as of March 2025,

many of whom have referred friends and family due to their positive experiences, we're making meaningful strides toward improving access to care and supporting recovery in our region.

Where We're Serving

Our mobile clinic currently offers substance use treatment services in:

- Anchor Point
- Kasilof
- Nikiski (one day per month)

New Partnerships on the Horizon

Starting in April 2025, we're excited to begin working in partnership with Salamatof to assist our neighboring tribal partners in establishing services and supporting patients in those communities. This partnership will help strengthen connections

and expand care options for those living in more remote areas.



What We Offer

- Low-Threshold Opioid Treatment: We provide accessible treatment, including injectable buprenorphine, to make starting and staying in treatment easier.
- Harm Reduction Services: Our team distributes naloxone, fentanyl and xylazine test strips while offering education and support to reduce the risk of overdose.
- Primary Care and Wellness: We address the whole person, providing primary care and support services to people who use substances that promote overall health and well-being.

Making an Impact

We are encouraged by the growing number of people who are engaging with social services and connecting to treatment through our mobile clinic. In February 2025 alone, we assisted three patients in accessing inpatient treatment services, helping them take critical steps toward recovery.

As we continue to expand services and build partnerships, we remain committed to ensuring that everyone - regardless of where they live - has access to life-saving treatment and compassionate care.
